Hiroo Saionji is President of the Goi Peace Foundation and the World Peace Prayer Society. He travels the world promoting dialogues and initiatives for peace. Mr. Saionji is the greatgrandson of Prince Kinmochi Saionji, who was twice Prime Minster of Japan during the Meiji Period. He currently serves as a member of the Japanese National Commission for UNESCO. In 2007, Mr. Saionji was awarded the Cultural Prize of the Dr. Lin Tsung-i Foundation of Taiwan, in recognition of his contributions to world peace. In 2010, he received the Social Education Distinguished Service Award from the Ministry of Education, Sports, Science and Technology of Japan.



Masami Saionji

Masami Saionji is Chairperson of the Goi Peace Foundation, Byakko Shinko Kai, and the World Peace Prayer Society, and an honorary member of the Club of Budapest. She promotes peace awareness and a new way of life based on our innate infinite creativity and potential. She has authored over twenty books in Japanese and ten in English and other languages, including *The Golden Key to Happiness, You Are the Universe*, and *Vision for the 21st Century*. In 2008, she and her husband Hiroo were awarded the Philosopher Saint Shree Dnyaneshwara World Peace Prize in India. She is also the recipient of the 2010 WON Award honoring distinguished women leaders and the 2016 Barbara Fields Humanitarian Peace Award.

After working at the United Nations Headquarters covering issues related to economic and social development, she was appointed the First Executive Director of the UNU. She then became Director of the Office of Human Resources Management at the UN. She also served as Executive Director of the Asian Women's Fund.



Mohammad Ali Bhuiyan

With over 30 years of experience in the corporate, academic, international, and non-profit sectors, Dr. Mohammad Ali Bhuiyan is a former candidate for US Congress from Georgia's 6th District and an expert in organizing entrepreneurship conferences and business plan competitions. He came to America from Bangladesh as a graduate student in 1986 to attend Georgia State University. He received a Ph.D. degree in economics/trade, two MBA degrees (one from Indian Institute of Management – Bangalore), and advanced leadership training from Harvard and MIT. Following her election to the Upper House of Japan's Diet in 1989, she played a pivotal role in the drafting of landmark social legislation and was an active participant in inter-parliamentary bodies. Since leaving the political sphere, she has dedicated herself to issues such as the environment, disasters, and women prisoners, with attention to human rights, gender equality, and diversity.



Fujiko Hara

Fujiko Hara has been an interpreter and teacher of interpreting for over twenty-five years. She is a member of AIIC (International Association of Conference Interpreters). Her work has included G-7 Economic Summits, InterAction Council meetings of former heads of state and government, the World Economic Forum, and top-level conferences and negotiations worldwide in all major fields. She is the granddaughter of Yukio Ozaki, a former mayor of Tokyo who presented Japanese flowering cherry trees to Washington, DC., and she is now a managing director of the Ozaki Yukio Memorial Foundation.



Miyuki Hatoyama

Miyuki Hatoyama is the wife of Yukio Hatoyama, Japan's 93rd Prime Minister. After a brief career as an actress in theater and television, she moved to the U.S. and married Mr. Hatoyama. After ten years, the family returned to Japan, where Miyuki supported her husband's political career. Her cooking, already enjoyed by so many in the States, began to gain popularity in Japan, and she authored her own cookbooks. She has since established herself as a "life composer," or lifestyle consultant. Following the Great East Japan Earthquake in 2011, she has held lectures called 'Miyuki-ryu' to enrich people's lives and explore the meaning of being here and now.



Remi le

After returning to Japan from Stanford University, Remi Ie started a private consulting firm focusing on Community Empowerment Design, assisting regional governments and corporations in Japan and overseas. In 2012, she became Ambassador of Japan for the GNH Center of the Royal Kingdom of Bhutan commissioned by the Prime Minister of Bhutan. In 2015, she acquired a Masters Degree from the University of Gastronomic Sciences in Italy, and after graduation, she was appointed as the Director of Japan for Slow Food International. She focuses on collaboration between regional governments, corporations and educational institutions, promoting Japanese food heritage as well as sustainable development.



Minako Imada

Minako Imada is a pioneer in the art of etiquette and table setting in Japan. After studying at a number of national cooking schools and hotels in Europe, she opened the "Salon de L'Art de la Table de Minako Imada," covering topics from table settings and etiquette to baking. She has received numerous awards throughout her career, including the first ever award given by the French government for table setting, and gold medals from Swiss and German national patisseries. Keiko Itokazu

Keiko Itokazu is a member the Japanese House of Councilors. Born in Okinawa and raised under U.S. occupation, she started working as a bus tour guide. She was elected as a member of Okinawa Prefectural Assembly in 1992 and served three consecutive terms. She was first elected to the House of Councilors in 2004. She delivered a speech during the United Nations World Conference on Indigenous Peoples in 2014.



Yoshiko Mitsui

Yoshiko Mitsui is Chairperson of the Special Olympics Nippon Foundation and Chairperson of the Yamagata Symphony Orchestra. While studying at Kobe City University, she got married and devoted herself to supporting her family. Since 1994, she has been involved in the Special Olympics (SO). She has made efforts to establish SO branch offices throughout Japan, as well as to turn SO Nippon into a public interest incorporated foundation. At the same time, she has contributed to its global activities as a board member of SO International. In 2017, the Japanese Para-Sports Association commended her for her outstanding achievements in support of people with intellectual disabilities.
